Report of the Senior Warden

Reflecting on 2017 as your Senior Warden what I always come back to is all that was accomplished by the two men who proceeded me. We as a Parish owe a great debt of gratitude to Rick Gamblin and John Dinning for all their work, as well as the Vestry in the time of their stewardship. Thanks to all of you.

Over the past year with the groundwork laid by Rick, John, Neill Bryant, Fr. Kell, the Vestry and others, we were able to pass much needed changes to our bylaws. A name change to St. Stephen's Anglican Church was approved as well as a logo that reflects this change. We have made an effort to improve the Church grounds with clearing and beautification projects that are still ongoing. An expanded Columbarium has been approved and work will begin on this shortly. Again, thanks to John Dinning for his leadership with this.

Our social network platform has improved greatly and under the leadership of Fr. Kell, a new website has launched this past month. Thanks to the generosity of the members of our Parish and the work of the Vestry, we introduced new Prayer Books and new Hymnals for our services at St. Stephen's. After being contacted by a new church plant in Oklahoma, our older prayer books were sent to them as they are now transitioning to the 1928 edition. St. Stephens and Fr. Kell received a heartfelt thank you from Fr. Richard Jones expressing his gratitude for the gift. Without doubt God is at work in and through St. Stephen's.

Just a brief word about our incredible ministerial staff. Fr. Kell is a masterful teacher and is wholeheartedly committed to the traditions of the REC. There is no better Rector in our Diocese and we are privileged to have him directing and ministering to our Parish. Dcn. Richard Rankin has led us through good times and bad; what a blessing he continues to be for our Parish. We currently have three Postulants: Calvin Basil, Eric Parker, and me; very learned, capable men that mean a great deal to us as a Parish and we are thankful for their work. We are also so fortunate to have the talented Tricia Dennis to lead our Music Department. All of our Department Heads do tremendous work leading different aspects of Christian life for all ages and both genders - thank you for your hard work and dedication.

Our Vestry continues to be active in the management of the business of our church. All are very caring, intelligent individuals that come together for one common purpose, the betterment of St. Stephens. They continue to do excellent work with your best interest in mind. Thanks to all of you!

We have some difficult financial decisions to make in the coming days, but by God's grace and with the continued support and dedication of the members of St. Stephen's we will persevere. We are grateful for each and every one of you.

Report of the Junior Warden

This year a few projects were completed and several are being planned:

- A new wooden cross was donated for use during worship.
- A new laptop computer was donated for Fr. Kell's use.
- A new copier was leased for the Church office.
- An easement for the installation of a power line across the north side of the church property was negotiated with Entergy.
- New prayer books were purchased with special donations and placed in the pew racks.
- Plans for expanding the columbarium were reviewed and the vestry approved the installation of an additional 64 niches.
- Plans are being made for the replacement of the protective exterior windows around the nave. Some of the windows in the parish hall need to be replaced. Quotes have been received from three companies.
- A new sign is being planned for the Church. Various designs have been reviewed by the vestry. The sign will be located on Church property to the right of the entry drive. Discussions are being held with the City of Flowood for a variance on the 10' height restriction for signs.
- The new website for the Church is up and running.
- A new security camera for the location at the back door to the office has been purchased and will be installed soon. Additional exterior security cameras and interior cameras for children's classrooms and the nursery are being considered.
- New hymnals were purchased with special donations and placed in the pew racks.
- Due to possible lightning damage, it was necessary to replace the secretary's computer and router.
- The new parish directory was published in August.
- Landscaping work including the clearing of underbrush and planting of flowers has been performed to open up and beautify the area around the parking lot and behind the playground. New shrubbery was donated and planted around the outdoor stairs leading to

the parish hall. Pine straw has been donated and spread around church beds twice. A new mailbox has been installed.

- New handrails were added to the outdoor stairs leading up to the back door of the parish hall. The open area under the outdoor stairs leading up to the nave was closed in with wood planks and painted.
- The coil for one of the outdoor air conditioning units that serves the nave was replaced.

Children's Church

Children's Church, directed by Christine Barron, provides hands-on, engaging, and age-appropriate lessons for four major time periods of the Church calendar. Children ages 4-12 are led through discussions and games in an exploration of Advent, Lent, Easter, and Ascension. To attend Children's Church, children are invited into the Fellowship Hall after the notices, and then are brought back to the service during the offertory.

For 2016, no money was spent, but for 2017, \$17 has been allotted to replace lost manipulatives for the Lenten lesson. More games and manipulatives will be needed for teaching about the seasons, but expenses are not projected to exceed \$75.

The dates for the future Children's Church lessons are: November 26th for Advent, February 11th for Lent, April 8th for Easter, and May 13th for Ascension.

Report on the Synod of the Diocese of Mid-America & the 2017 General Council of the Reformed Episcopal Church

Fr. Kell, Richard and Jane Allison attended the 109th Synod of the Diocese of Mid-America, and the 55th General Council of the Reformed Episcopal Church held at the Embassy Suites in Dallas, Texas June 14 – 16, 2017.

To quote from Bishop Sutton's report and Romans 8:28, "And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to *his* purpose." Truly, there were people from all over the world here working together for Him.

Several points from the Synod held the morning of June 14:

- The Very Rev. Walter Banek From the Good Shepherd Church in Tyler, Texas was presented and elected as the Suffragant Bishop
- All by-laws are to be provided to the Ven. Dr. James T Payne, and to Deaconess Annette Johnson
- All reports including the budget were approved and are available upon request.

The General Council met the afternoon of June 14 through Friday June 16 at noon. Many reports were presented and approved. All reports are available upon request.

Bishop Sutton presented his report June 14. Bishop Sutton has devoted his prayer and attention to the vision God initially gave to Most Rev. Royal Grote- a vision that Bishop Grote called REC 100. More will be presented on this vision later.

Chris Hoyt, a most talented musician and organist from the Church of the Holy Communion and the Chairman of the Liturgical Music Commission, presented a wonderful program on the revised Hymnal at the banquet. This was the culmination of twelve years of very hard work by a group of talented individuals to update the present 1940 Hymnal. There were 400 of the original 800 that remain in the new hymnal, and many old and new favorites have been added for a total of 600 hymns. The index has been improved to include distinct categories that were omitted from the 1940 Hymnal, and more hymns added to several occasions that were lacking in the number of hymns. There was no mandate for parishes to change to the new hymnal, but the music contained therein will be more conducive to present day.

On Thursday June 15, all clergy and delegates traveled to the Church of the Holy Communion for the installation of the Presiding Bishop, the Most Rev. Ray R. Sutton, and a service of Holy Communion.

At the second night's banquet, a presentation of foreign missions was given by several clergy. These presentations were most interesting and humbling to those attending.

Presenters included:

- Fr. Matt Colvin, who visited St. Stephens with his family last fall, who were in mission work in the Philippines and Indonesia

- Bishop Meyer and his wife, Grace, from Germany
- Bishop Milic from Croatia and Serbia
- Bishop Willans Mendez Suarez, along with Claudia Dorrington, presented missions in Cuba

Throughout the meeting, Bishop Sutton presented the program first visualized by Bishop Grote on REC 100.

To Revitalize Mission in the Parish Means:

- Remaining Committed to Prayer Book Worship as we have approved in the REC
- “Reaching out without dumbing down” (Marva Dawn book title), the worship of God or the content of the faith
- Rising from a preservation mindset to promotion of the Gospel... The dual movement of Holy Altar Table to Mission and Mission to the Throne of God should drive everything we do... Therefore mission/evangelism is more than a committee tacked on to everything else.
- Resulting in the making of disciples in the Anglican Way to become worshippers through the multiplication of prayer book congregations.
- Realizing that the world of post modernity is different and has rendered certain approaches to evangelism much less effective.

We should see our work of Mission as a Parish Task of the Whole... The Entire Community of the Parish bringing people to Christ. Question: Is our Parish a mission-al Community?

1. The Parish must become a Community desiring to move from preservation to proclamation, to become a worshipping community on mission.
2. The vestry should create a five-year long-range plan..with objective, quantifiable goals, with a vision and mission reflected in them, and a strategy for developing a Proclamation Parish with front porch ministries to all three disciple groups/cultures with all four aspects of the Great Commission
3. Present the recorded Gospel Tree sermon, the REC 100 Prospectus and the Revitalization talks to the parish
4. Create front porch ministries
5. Form intercessory teams and Daughters of the Holy Cross prayer groups to pray for the parish day and night
6. Commit to the REC 100 in the church, your diocese, and parish

One last point, Bishop Grote and Sutton want parishes to commit to having each adult member of the church to donate \$100 each to missions like we did for the Lenten season this year.

Missions

During this church year we supported the Colvin Family as missionaries to Indonesia. Due to health issues, the Colvins decided that they needed to leave Indonesia. The Vestry has

decided to focus our church's foreign missions efforts in support of Fr. James Crofts and St. Stephen's Reformed Episcopal Church in Neuss, Germany. On Sunday, October 22nd, Dr. West will present his ministry and how we can assist him and the church he serves.

St. Stephen's is to be commended for its generous response to the Bhp. Suttons call to give money to toward the building of a Reformation Museum in Croatia. St. Stephen's collectively gave \$3,651.00 throughout Lent to assist this means of Gospel. Thank you.

St. Stephen's has also generously exercised charity by giving to the relief of those who have been effected by hurricanes Harvey and Irma.

The Daughter of the Holy Cross and other church members supported the ministry of Joni and Friends, Jackson by delivering Christmas gifts to community members, as well as children of our own church, with disabilities. We will engage in this ministry again this Christmas. Members may sign up on the missions' bulletin board to participate in this program. We need to let Joni and Friends know the numbers of recipients we can gift by November 8. In addition, The Sisters of St. Stephen's and individual church members financially sponsored a family with two sons with disabilities to attend the Joni and Friends Family Camp in July. We hope to have the family visit with us shortly.

In December members of our church, including children and young people, rang the bell for the Salvation Army in front of the Dogwood Festival Kroger. We will be doing this work again this year. We will know the exact date and location by Missions Sunday. Families and individuals will be able to sign up to participate once the date has been confirmed.

Finally, in the past year we began helping to serve lunch at the Stewpot in downtown Jackson. About a dozen members of St. Stephen's, at various times, participated in this program. We will continue to support this ministry until at least December.

At the last General Council Dr. West was elected to serve on the Board of Foreign Missions. Her participation will help us to be fully informed about our denomination's foreign missions efforts.

Recommendations:

1. That a missions committee be formed to guide the involvement of our congregation in local and foreign missions works.
